MOLLY'S SERMON

Okay, so some of you are probably wondering just what makes me qualified to be up here. I would be with you, but these two asked me, and when you're invited to tea at Windsor Castle, you don't ask the Queen for a rain check.

And, since I've had a chance to think about it, I do have some experience. I'm one half of a working marriage - my husband and I will celebrate our 8th anniversary next month and we were together for five years before that. So now that I've been given this opportunity to reflect on marriage, I realize there are a few things I'd like to share with you as you head into yours.

I've also had a while to ponder the beautiful poem we just heard- and WOW, is it YOU. But also, really, it's an incredible evocation of being in the NOW, not just feeling love but exploring it from every angle, measuring and quantifying it, figuring out the ins and outs of another person, deciding who is *the dew on the morning grass*, and who is *the shooting star*.

But, as important as this act of love, this being in love, is to the marriage that you begin today (and everyone always says that the greatest thing is love), I think there's an equal act you're making today, an act of faith.

In fact, what happens today is really a pledge of faith – the act comes later. Because right now your love is basically quantifiable- you know who's who and what's what. You fell in love, you became engaged, and you stand here today because you believe with great conviction that this is the love of your life, the one for you, your other half...And you're right. She is. He is. But, the thing to be ready for- I've learned this in my own marriage, for sure – is that that one of you who stands here today and is "*certainly not the pine-scented air*" might very well one day wake up to be, in fact, strongly pine-scented.

There will come a time, it's true, when you wake up and marvel at how much your partner has changed. Or how much you've changed. There will be a time when you can't figure out who is who anymore, and it might even feel like you don't want to know.
